

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
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Winter News

Well, it's that time of year and we all know the w--- comes with winter. I hesitate to say the word as it seems to bring it on. We have had a taste of gusty weather already, but nothing like what we may be in store for. I know because all the leaves in Devore end up in my pool. Even so, I wouldn't live anywhere else.

Now for the news: Spring Trails (formerly known as Martin Ranch) is being revisited. The 304 single family homes, 108 acres of open space, hiking trails, roads and detention basins on 350.6 acres was rejected by the planning commission on November 14, 2012. An appeal has been filed and the next date was to be the December Planning Commission meeting, but was again continued until the January 14th meeting. This plan is having difficulty due to the access being limited to exit the area. They have Palm Ave. as the exit and are looking for another access for traffic flow. Guess where that would be? Some of you will remember years back when this development tried to push for traffic to be sent to Devore via Cable Canyon/Dement onto Santa Fe and then Devore Road. We fought hard to prevent the 3000+ vehicles accessing our rural streets then, and may have to do so again. I fear they will again attempt to send the traffic toward Devore to alleviate the congestion at Palm. This would devastate Devore as we know it. No more jogging, hiking, walking, running, equestrian or just plain quiet country enjoyment if this is allowed to happen. Devore will need to unite over this issue and protect what we have or we might as well become San Bernardino city residents because we will have the traffic, noise, litter and graffiti that city life brings. We will keep you posted as we follow this development very closely.

As you know by now, the DRPA meetings have been moved to the Devore Water Company building due to issues with the San Bernardino Unified School District. The November meeting ended up being a small informal meeting as traffic prevented most from even getting home until late. We will still be having the Christmas Parade/Pot Luck/Raffle at the school. You should have gotten a flyer and there is a notice in this issue as well. Come, enjoy the parade, and bring a favorite dish to share and some money to buy raffle tickets (proceeds support the community). As in the past, the chicken is provided.

I would like to congratulate my son Brett on his recent marriage. One down, one to go. If you have family news or articles and/or stories you would like to submit, please send it to me and I'll make sure it gets in the newsletter. We all love to hear community news.

I would also like to thank Jennifer Schmidt and her parents for their work on the last two issues of the newsletter. Jennifer has chosen to move on and we all wish her well in her future endeavors. My husband David has agreed to take on the newsletter. With help from Darcee and Doug, this newsletter will get out. I want to thank everyone for their contributions and hope to see articles and stories continue in the newsletter.

The I-15/I-215 freeway reconstruction is moving forward. There is an issue with the Arrowhead Ave. access for the Arco station. I have spoken to Fred and he was unaware that they intended to close Arrowhead and open a second driveway on Devore Road. This may cause difficulty for many to access the station and could cause traffic backup on Devore Road. Fred has submitted documentation to SANBAG and is awaiting an answer. This is something that may cause his business to be greatly impacted and should be resolved before the project moves forward. We will stay on top of this as we have always supported our Devore businesses and will continue to do so.

Lastly, I want to apologize for any articles or advertisements that were missed in previous issues. We do not intend to reject any submissions. The new editor will make every effort to include all articles, news items and stories received.

I hope to see all of you at the Parade/Pot Luck/Raffle. Happy Holidays to you all and remember Devore is Rural living at its finest!

Important note: I got a call from a resident about the mountain lion that has been seen around town. The last report had the cat in a tree in a back yard back in February. July 5th brought another sighting on Kimbark across from Kimbark School. The Sheriff was notified. I heard that a cat was shot/darted north on Kimbark above the school.

From the Nurse's Corner

Welcome to the Winter edition of From the Nurse's Corner. I was recently walking around my property and decided to try my hand at walking on one of my many walls that surround my driveway and found that I have lost some of my ability to keep my balance as I walked. This started me thinking about aging and balance.

The definition of balance is the body's ability to keep equilibrium against gravity. Balance is a combination of the brain, muscles and bones working together in harmony along with vision, the inner ear and the sense of where your body is in space. Statistics state that your body's ability to maintain balance peaks at the age of 20 and from the age of 30 declines slowly. After the age of 65, the process of balance loss excels quickly. Over 20 million people are affected with balance problems that affect their everyday life. Balance is one of the major contributors to falls in the elderly.

Balance can be preserved or even restored with a few simple exercises daily. Most fitness centers now offer classes that use balance boards and balls, but exercising at home is just as effective. Here is a list of some really simple exercises to start with to improve your balance:

- ❖ Stand on one foot while waiting in line anywhere.
- ❖ Stand on one foot while brushing your front teeth and switch to the other foot while brushing the back teeth.
- ❖ Have someone toss you a Frisbee or ball while standing on one foot.
- ❖ Practice walking heel to toe.

Practice some of these daily and then when you have mastered these, try doing them with your eyes closed!! The Wii games use a lot of balance and so does bike riding. Try new things and challenge your body to adapt. Core exercises that strengthen your stomach are most important.

Christmas is just around the corner and our balance can be challenged during this season. Be especially careful while putting up Christmas lights, decorating the Christmas tree and retrieving boxes of Christmas ornaments from the attic. After many years of storing my Christmas decorations in my garage attic in huge boxes that were unmanageable, I finally got wise and now store them in smaller boxes on ground level. My husband and I now put up the outside lights together so that we can watch each other while we are on the ladder.

Ladders need to be sturdy with large steps. Always wear shoes that fit well and make sure laces are tied before climbing a ladder. As we age, our bodies just need a little extra help to remain healthy and safe!

Suggestion of the month: If you ever visit an emergency room on Christmas morning, you will find many a mom or dad that are there getting stitches because they tried to open a gift with a sharp knife or scissors!!! Please take the time before you wrap a gift to remove all straps that hold the gift in place!!! Taking the time to remove all straps prior to wrapping the gift will insure not only safe fingers and hands, but will make your child very happy!!

And while shopping, remember to add socks, undies, sweats and shirts and take them directly to your local clothes bank! The people that need a little extra help are growing and it only takes a minute to help!

The Saga of Willie Boy Part 1

Many of you may remember a 1969 movie by the name Tell Them Willie Boy Was Here, The Story of Willie Boy was the basis for Harry Lawton's novel, Willie Boy; A Desert Man Hunt, and the subsequent movie Tell Them Willie Boy Was Here, starring Robert Redford, Robert Blake, Katherine Ross, and Susan Clark.

There were a number of the Morongo Indian Reservation members that had roles in the movie.

Who was Willie Boy and is the story true? The basic story is true and really happened, but there are a lot of unanswered questions.

The story of Willie Boy is about a 28 year old Paiute-Chemehuevi Indian who shot and killed the father of a 16 year old girl he loved and then led lawmen on a deadly desert pursuit.

The newspapers saw this as a chance to boost circulation. The press called this "The Last Great Manhunt" of the old west. National headlines and rumors of a presidential assassination and an Indian uprising flooded the pages of the major newspapers. President William Howard Taft was due to arrive in San Bernardino and Riverside counties as part of a national trip to improve his presidential image. Willie boy went down in history as a drunken Indian murderer and a potential assassin, who lusted after the teenage girl he had kidnapped and murdered.

HOW IT STARTED

In 1900, a 19 year old Willie Boy was living in Victorville with his sister and her family. When two little boys, ages 6 and 8, were orphaned, Willie Boy took care of them, moving them from a nearby reservation. Willie Boy was a hard working quiet cowpuncher with a good sober reputation. Willie Boy never left the Mojave Desert, working at ranches all along highway 62 in Morongo and Yucca Valleys and Joshua Tree before moving to Twenty Nine Palms.


It was there that he fell in love with his 16 year distant cousin, Carlota Boniface.

Willie had been married before, but that marriage had failed within the previous year.

Carlota's father, Mike Boniface, nick- named "Old Mike", was no ordinary man to reckon with. Mike was a Shaman of Willie's tribe, and a very powerful individual with spiritual authority and he refused to let his daughter marry a relative, no matter how distant. Tribal customs forbade such a marriage, declaring it would only bring shame and dishonor to their families. Besides that, Mike just didn't like Willie Boy.

Despite her father's objections, Carlota ran off with Willie, and the two spent the night together before relatives brought them back.

A few months later, Carlota's family moved to pick fruit on the Gilman Ranch some 80 miles east of Los Angeles. Willie Boy followed. On Sept 26th, still crazy in love with Carlota, Willie Boy confronted Old Mike with a gun. Whether he shot Old Mike or the Shaman was killed in a struggle over the gun is another one of those many unanswered questions. Even as her husband lay dead in front of her, Carlota's mother was sympathetic to the two. She gave them several hours head start before calling the Tribal Police. A posse of 5 men set off in pursuit. In an effort to elude the posse, Willie and Carlota began backtracking and circling, covering nearly 600 miles across the barren desert landscape. Averaging nearly 50 miles a day in 100 degree heat the couple managed to stay ahead of the lawmen for 12 days. **END PART 1**



In My Opinion

Well, did you receive it yet.. the new Cal Fire tax for rural areas? Mine was \$115.00 for 1 habitable space to live in Devore. How about you? Wait! I thought we had a county fire station in Devore. Why are we charged an extra tax (oh, I need to be correct...fee) for Cal Fire to take care of us when Cal Fire is only part-time in Devore? The station closes upon the first rains (about November) and does not begin again until the rains subside (about April). Our San Bernardino County Fire is taking huge strides to protect our community by forming a hand crew, dozers, air support, etc. It is my opinion that we should be taken care of by the very county that we live in, not hope for an extra tax to go ??? and then expect Cal Fire to take over. We should support our County Fire in their efforts to be independent in these areas and not rely upon state agencies. It is my opinion that we should stand with the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association that has filed a law suit challenging the legality of the fire tax. Hopefully, they are successful.

Below is taken from the Rutherford Report from our County Supervisor Janice Rutherford:

RESIDENTS RECEIVE BILLS FOR STATE FIRE “FEE”

Last month, thousands of San Bernardino County residents who live in rural areas received bills for the so-called “California Fire Prevention Fee”.

This \$150-per-habitable-structure charge applies to residents who own property in State Responsibility Areas (SRA). Most unincorporated communities in the County are considered to be within an SRA even if they are already served by a local fire agency and aren’t even close to a California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection station.

Some unincorporated residents whose properties are not located in an SRA have received bill in error.

My fellow Supervisors and I, and countless other local elected leaders across the State have opposed this fee, which is called a “fee” because the Legislature couldn’t meet the 2/3 vote requirement for a new tax.

Sacramento has pressed ahead with the fee’s implementation despite local opposition.

But thankfully, the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association has filed a lawsuit challenging the legality of the fire tax, and if the lawsuit is successful, residents could receive refunds.

Residents should file a petition of redetermination with three State agencies to protest the fee. Residents can find information and documents needed to file this petition at www.firetaxprotest.org. The State’s official “Fire Prevention Fee Service Center” can be reached at 888-310-6447.

Take the time to research this tax. File your forms.

You must submit it *WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF YOUR BILL* to the three addresses below:

What 2007 movie directed by Sean Penn includes scenes filmed at Ocotillo Wells?




